



SAPPER GEORGE R. HIFLE, CANADIAN ENGINEERS.

Official notification has been received by his mother that Sapper George Raymond Hifle, of the Canadian Engineers, died on the 5th September of gunshot wounds in the head received the previous day. Mr. Hifle, who was the elder son of the late Mr. John Hifle and of Mrs. Hifle, late of Castle street, Tralee, joined the first Canadian Contingent immediately that the call was made in Canada. He went through the training in England last winter, and was sent to the Western front in February last. He came unscathed through all the engagements that he took part in since, including the famous Hill 60 fight in April, though having some very remarkable escapes, until the 4th September, when he was wounded in the head, and died on the following day. Sapper Hifle was educated at Wesley College, and spent several years as chemist's assistant at Messrs. Evans, Dawson street, Dublin, and Dr. Starkey, Rathmines.
